ABIDE Young Adult Retreat Reflection by Kailani Tiernan

(Youth Coordinator, St. Francis Xavier Parish Ballina)

The Lismore Diocesan ABIDE retreat led by Bishop Gregory Homeming, OCD, and Fr. Joy Dsouza, OCD provided a transformative experience for young adults aged 18-35, drawing us from across the Diocese to Invercauld House in Goonellabah. The retreat immersed attendees in the power of silence as a conduit for deepening their connection with God.

Throughout the retreat, we were engaged in periods of silence, both individually and in group settings, fostering an environment free from judgment and distractions. Keynotes and talks delved into essential topics such as the Eucharist's significance within the Jewish worldview, the vital role of silence in prayer, and distinguishing between authentic communication with God and mere self-reflection.

Central to the retreat experience were moments of communal prayer, including the Divine Office, Mass, Adoration, and Confession. All of us were encouraged to reflect on our relationship with God and to cultivate the inner silence necessary for hearing His voice amidst life's busyness.

Bishop Greg emphasised the importance of scripture reading, urging us to approach the Holy Bible with humility and a contrite heart. He highlighted the Gospels' role in deepening one's love for Jesus and underscored prayer as a response to God's love, guiding individuals towards a profound friendship with the Divine.

The retreat concluded with reflections on creating a space for silence in daily life and the transformative power of communal silence in building authentic relationships.

I would like to express my gratitude to Bishop Greg, OCD, Fr. Joy, OCD and Sr. Di Moralde for their guidance, as well as to all participants for embracing the invitation to ABIDE in God's presence together.

Reading Reflection

The offer of God's friendship

Parents often offer these words of encouragement and support to their children when they have to move to a new place or to a new school, "It will be alright; you will make new friends."

It can be difficult not only for children but for anyone to leave old friendships behind and to seek new friends. It reinforces the importance that we place on strong relationships, and the common bonds that develop through important milestones and junctures of our lives.

Many people enjoy friendships that start in primary school that last through university, careers, relationships, children and grandchildren. Lifelong friendships can be some of the most cherished and important things in our lives. Priceless treasures.

In today's gospel, Jesus offers us God's friendship. "I have called you friends, because I have told you everything I have heard from my Father. It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you." With these words, Jesus reveals God's desire to have a different type of relationship with us. A relationship that is based on a deep, true and personal friendship.

This relationship is about God being with us in the very ordinariness of our lives. In the marketplace, at the coffee shop, the park, the beach and, more importantly, in our homes. It is because in these locations that we normally catch up with our friends to share our thoughts and desires, God wants to have that kind of relationship with us too in these places.

God wants to establish a relationship that moves beyond worship and one that enters into deep, heartfelt and very real conversations. To move beyond sterile prayer halls and into the sometimes messiness and grey areas of our very human condition. Importantly, we should understand that in God wanting to be friends with us, there is a deep acceptance and understanding of our flawed person. A safe place where we can bare all with no fear of condemnation. A place where God is listening and accepting.

St Alphonsus, the founder of the Redemptorists wrote extensively on this wonderful idea of God as a friend and these writings have been compiled into a book titled, *Praying to God as a Friend*. Despite the gospels revealing this more than 2000 years ago and St Alphonsus writing about this over 300 years ago, the notion of God as a friend is still a relatively novel idea today. But it's there, right in front of us in today's gospel.

God's friendship is waiting. It is truly priceless treasure that is freely offered and freely given. It is up to us to respond positively.

FIRST READING

Acts of the Apostles 10:25-26. 34-35. 44-48 As Peter reached the house Cornelius went out to meet him, knelt at his feet and prostrated himself. But Peter helped him up. 'Stand up,' he said, 'I am only a man after all!'

Then Peter addressed them: 'The truth I have now come to realise' he said, 'is that God does not have favourites, but that anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him.'

While Peter was still speaking the Holy Spirit came down on all the listeners. Jewish believers who had accompanied Peter were all astonished that the gift of the Holy Spirit should be poured out on the pagans too, since they could hear them speaking strange languages and proclaiming the greatness of God. Peter himself then said, 'Could anyone refuse the water of baptism to these people, now they have received the Holy Spirit just as much as we have?' He then gave orders for them to be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ. Afterwards they begged him to stay on for some days.

The Word of the Lord. Response: Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL

John 15:9-17 Jesus said to his disciples:

> 'As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you. Remain in my love. If you keep my commandments you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and remain in his love. I have told you this so that my own joy may be in you and your joy be complete. This is my commandment: love one another, as I have loved you. A man can have no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends, if you do what I command you, I shall not call you servants any more, because a servant does not know his master's business: I call you friends, because I have made known to you everything I have learnt from my Father. You did not choose me, no, I chose you; and I commissioned you to go out and to bear fruit, fruit that will last; and then the Father will give you anything you ask him in my name. What I command you is to love one another.'

The Gospel of the Lord. Response: Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.
